Pastor's Message-

Half-empty or half-full?

Everyone has heard that conundrum: if there are 4 ounces of liquid in an 8 ounce glass, is the glass half-empty or half-full? Supposedly your answer reveals whether or not you are an optimist. I suspect it won't surprise you to read that I always see the glass half full!

Recently I read an op-ed piece in the New York Times¹ in which the commentator noted that one can divide this country between those who think that humans are fundamentally bad and those who think that humans are fundamentally good. The former believe that we are born bad, and have to be taught to be good. The latter believe that we are born good, and if we behave badly, we can learn how to return to our natural (good) state. The author then noted that these are fundamentally religious beliefs - and what we believe about human nature says a lot about what we believe about God. One group believes we need God to keep us in line with threats of punishment and blame. The other group believes that God is created us good, and forces outside ourselves cause us to act badly. Remove the outside influence and we can get back to our naturally good selves.

Clearly, the author hasn't met many Lutherans.

As we begin to celebrate the 500th year of our founder, Martin Luther, it is worth remembering his insistence on both/and: we are both saved AND sinner, *simul iustus* et *peccator*. As Lutherans, we walk the precarious line between believing in the goodness of God, and therefore God's creation (including our selves!), and the bone-deep awareness that, left to our own devices, we will constantly move away from our good selves and rarely do the right thing, or even the good thing. What differentiates us from conservative evangelical

Christians is that important both/and: while we do believe that "too err is human," we also cling to the knowledge that "to forgive is divine." No matter what we have done to hurt others, or ourselves, in our baptisms we know that we are forgiven, daily, and always given an opportunity to start all over again. That ability to turn away from sin and towards God is a daily walk, struggle, journey, and gift; and the knowledge that we are beloved with a love that passes all understanding is a mystery that gives us hope — hope for ourselves, and hope for humanity. If God can forgive and love *even someone like me*, then surely God can forgive and love someone like you!

It never occurred to me to think about whether Lutherans were particularly optimistic or pessimistic about life – certainly you can find both in every congregation and parish – but there is something wonderful in recalling that if, at our deepest core, we are loved and loveable, then we can always "return to the Lord," and return to our truest selves – the good people that God created us to be. Are we capable of tremendous, mind-boggling, sin? Absolutely. But after our baptisms, we acknowledge a sea-change in our human nature and can always turn toward the good.

FINANCIAL RESULTS THROUGH NOVEMBER, 2016

Our total Operating giving for NOVEMBER 2016 was \$6,894 and our expenses were \$6,778 giving us a gain for the month of \$116 decreasing our year-to-date loss to \$10,451. As the above shows our giving this year is behind last year by \$6,237 and behind our budget by \$18,695. Our average expenses are below our budget by about 10 % and only \$1,774 over last year thru November. With December receipts of \$8,993 we should be able to reduce our deficit to under \$10,000 for the year.

Through November of 2016 we have received \$5,435 toward our New England Synod annual pledge of \$6050. With December's receipts, we should reach our commitment.

Pastor Daphne is celebrating 30 years of ordained ministry!

On Sunday, February 1, 1987, Daphne Llewellyn Burt was ordained *Pastor* Daphne Llewellyn Burt at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Atlanta Georgia. At least 15 clergy - Lutheran, Episcopalian, United Methodist and Roman Catholic - joined the outgoing bishop, Gerry Troutman, and the incoming bishop, Harold Skilrud, in the laying on of hands. Pastor Daphne was the fifth woman to be ordained in the Southeastern Synod, and the first at Redeemer. She celebrated communion for the first time on February 2 at Luther Homes, a senior living community next door to Redeemer.

Pastor Daphne's first call was to Christ Church in Bristol, Tennessee. From there she served as chaplain to Newberry College in Columbia, SC, and then went to be the pastor of Bethany Lutheran Church in Boone, NC. After Bethany, Pastor Daphne became transition pastor at Mary and Martha Lutheran Church in Durham, NC, then moved to Virginia to be the campus minister at the Campus Christian Community, serving Mary Washington College in Fredericksburg, VA. From Virginia, Pastor Daphne moved to Chicago, where she was Associate Dean of Rockefeller Chapel at the University of Chicago; then she returned to Virginia as Chaplain to the University of Richmond in Richmond, Virginia. After the University of Richmond, Pastor Daphne was Religion teacher and Chaplain at St. Paul's School in Concord, NH and the Williston Northampton School in Easthampton, MA. She came to us after having been interim pastor of Trinity Lutheran on Staten Island.

That's lots of ministry to celebrate!
